

The project resulted in some interviews with local residents, photos and documents were collected and identified, a 32-page book was published - and the presentation shared with us this night.



Minutes of the June '07 Meeting

President Linda Ciangi opened the membership meeting of the Ionia County Historical Society at approx. 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, June 6, 2007 at the Blanchard House. She opened with a summary comment about our recent successes with the June Yard Sale (with thanks to Gene Werdehof and her

committee) and the Home Tour (with thanks to Bob Nixon and the several committees).

President Ciangi then asked for two or three volunteers to help advise the Board of Directors on projects at the Blanchard House to help evaluate and prioritize them, and address sources of funding.

PRWAMO

Sandy introduced her son, Tony, who had refined and adapted the presentation as part of a class he was taking at Lansing Community College. Tony began his slide show, narrating from notes and occasionally calling upon his mom to tell a certain story or two along the way. Photos showed vintage views of Pewamo and contrasted them with modern images. The "then and now" was very interesting.

The Pewamo area, according to the Wolniakowskis, attracted the first white settlers from New York State about 1834. John Gee and Thaddeous Warner, meeting up with previous settlers William Hunt and William Burgess in Lyons, scouted for suitable lands to start their homesteads. Gee went back to New York and returned in 1836; he later constructed a sawmill on Stoney Creek.

In 1857, the first railroad through central Michigan changed the fate of many a small settlement along the route. Stores and workshops sprang up, and A.F. Bell surveyed the village. July 25, 1859, the plat was recorded, and this is celebrated as the birth of the town. The post office was set up, and the town was on the map.

The name, Pewamo, was that of a local Indian who lived in the area at the time. Mr. John C. Blanchard, a relative of Hiram Blanchard who was a merchant in the village, had known and hunted with Pewamo, and suggested that this would be a fine name for the town. Years later, the native was told that he had a town named after him, and was well pleased! Pewamo returned to the town in subsequent years, leaving a legacy of fun and firewater.

Our presenters related tales of local landmarks - homes and hotels, stores and saloons, churches and schools - and also the significance of the grain elevator to the town for many decades. There were celebrations, but also disasters - the most memorable being deadly train wrecks in 1905 and 1944.

As with many towns, it contains some ups and some downs. But to this day, it remains a fine community with a great heritage. Our thanks to Sandy and Tony for their presentation.
