The Two Freds

Fred Chapman (the younger) was introduced to the members by Joe McCord, who shared some biographical notes about our guest speaker, his career and on-going community involvement in Ionia County.

Mr. Chapman took the podium, starting up his overhead projector, and introducing the audience to "the two Freds" — Fred W. Green and Fred A. Chapman. Although the two actually had little in common other than name; Green was short, Chapman was tall; Green was gregarious, Chapman was reserved; Green was a socialite, Chapman was a manager. But they proved to be a remarkable team, complimenting each others talents and capabilities on many joint ventures throughout the years.

Fred Green held a law degree, had been 1st Lieutenant in the Spanish-American War, and became an attorney in Ann Arbor. Fred Chapman had been born in Leeds, England, coming to the U.S. with his parents via Toronto when he was 4 years old. Later settling in Detroit, Chapman got into the reed furniture business there when he came of age.

Reed furniture was becoming exceedingly popular at the time, and the enterprising Mr. Green speculated in the industry as well. In 1903, through Mr. Green's acquaintance with a John Thwaites, president of an existing furniture manu-

Minutes of the August '07 Meeting

The August meeting of the ICHS was called to order by president Linda Ciangi at approximately 7:00 p.m. at the Blanchard House on Wednesday, August 1. Due to the heat and humidity waving all around the room!

It was moved by Bob Nixon and supported by Gerry Perry to accept the

secretary's report as published - motion carried. Hank Knoop delivered the Treasurer's report, noting that the June & July income was \$1640, and the expenses amounted to \$1660 total. There are also several new memberships included in that income total, and invoices going out to our "business buddies" of the day, hand fans were to solicit their annual contributions. 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factory, both Freds became part owners, then later co-owners, of the reed furniture firm based in Ypsilanti.

Green was the idea man, the negotiator and entrepreneur: Chapman was the "go-to guy" and talented manager of industry. This partnership resulted in a prosperous enterprise.

Mr. Green, seeking more profitable means of production, discovered the labor force within the Michigan prisons just at a time that the prison system - particularly in Ionia - was seeking to diversify. The Ionia Reformatory had just lost a lucrative agreement in textile production and had the workforce and facilities; the two Freds had the resources, know-how, and market for the reed furniture business. In 1903, a deal was struck, and the community of Ionia was set on a new course.

So then, in addition to the prison farm production, shoes, soap, cigars, and other furniture, 280 prisoners began a new trade within the walls of MR. By 1907,. the two Freds (now majority stock holders in the company) and the entire operation had moved to Ionia and a new level of success.

But this success began to outgrow the capacity of the prison facility, and by 1912 the new facility at Main and Dexter was put into production with employees from the community. In 1913, just as the new facility began production, there was a fire at the prison which destroyed the factory and its inventory, so production was accelerated for the new factory to meet the demand. By 1918, there was no more prison labor employed by the com-

To the benefit of Ypsilanti Reed Furniture Company, the automotive industry was beginning to grow, and needing skilled woodworkers and industrial innovators. A close relationship with the industry (our presenter showed photos of Green and Chapman with Henry and Clara Ford, and noted meetings with auto-industry giants like R.E. Olds and others) expanded a role for Ionia in that industry that continues today.

In 1915, Green and Chapman bought into a struggling paint company in Grand Rapids. They continues on page 3

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were initially their own best customer, producing varnishes for their Reed furniture, but that company later grew into a national concern, developing new metal finishes for Steelcase furniture and more. That concern eventually became today's Guardsman products, a division of Valspar.

Another of the pairs' endeavors that still exists today is the Ionia Free Fair. In 1915, after the earlier Ionia District Fair had folded, Green (while serving as mayor of Ionia) proposed the concept of the Free Fair. Free admission was quite a revolutionary idea, and caught on quickly. The city of Ionia purchased the fairgrounds, Green served as president and Chapman as secretary, and they rallied all their influence to bring in air shows, agricultural exhibits, automobile displays, plus circus acts and entertainment. The attraction was effective - and over 17,000 people visited the first Free Fair.

Both Green and Chapman were on the board of the National Bank when it was reorganized in 1934, and were prominent in many community affairs. Fred Green pursued higher office, too, becoming Governor of Michigan for two terms beginning in 1927. He was Governor then during the closing years of the "roaring '20s" and left office just after the stock market crash. Most of his tenure was during years of almost rampant prosperity, and Gov. Green (recognizing the importance of travel tourism to Michigan) was known as the "Road Governor." Many highways and road improvements were instituted during this time, and Gov. Green is credited with inventing the "double yellow line" now seen on every major roadway. Fred Chapman, meanwhile, headed the Ionia County Road Commission, and later took the position of Warden for the Reformatory.

Through the early thirties, the two Freds continued to be involved in community affairs, economic, social, and political - until Fred W. Green passed away in December of 1936, and the partnership became a matter of history. His long-time partner Fred Chapman passed away in 1938.

"The two Freds" shaped much of Ionia's community through the first several decades of the 20th century for which we are all thankful. And our thanks to our friend Fred Chapman for his presentation.
