

St. John the Apostle Episcopal Church

A presentation was made by Justin Gregory, sub deacon of the Church, assisted by Julia Sharp.

The Parrish House (where our meeting was held and our tour began) was originally built in 1841, the building then faced Kidd Street (known then as Norville Street.) Many of the city founders were parishioners – recognizable names such as General Kidd, the Osmond Tower family, the Dexters, and more. To pay for its construction, the sixteen pews of the original church were auctioned off, with the highest amount paid being \$16.00. The total amount received was \$136.50. Traditional plaques were placed on the pews identifying these owners per the auction. This building was moved to its current location in 1881 to allow for the construction of the current





church building. (The original and current church buildings face west – an Episcopal tradition.) The original building remained essentially unchanged until 1963 when the formal kitchen was added, replacing a lean-to addition of many years before. (It remains the oldest building in the City.)

In 1843, the church's doors were closed due to pressing financial issues. Mrs. Dexter then used the building as a school. The church was restarted about 1860 by Reverend Mitchell. The reopening of the church was accomplished through the filing of a law suit which forced Mrs. Dexter to relinquish her hold on the property. Mr. Gregory shared pictures with the members of the original church / parrish house (some of which are reproduced here).

The new church was built in

The new church was built in 1881 at a cost of \$7,000, constructed of VanderHayden brick. Its pews were "borrowed" from the First Baptist Church, and finally replaced with the existing pews in 1971. The "Bishop's Chair" behind the altar is believed to have come from the original church. The original communion rail is now in the rear of the church with a brass communion rail installed in the outer area of the sanctuary.

The church remains essentially unchanged except for rewiring of

MINUTES of the January 2009 Meetings

The Secretary's report was accepted as published (as moved by R. Nixon, supt. by M. Gallagher).

Thursday night work sessions at the Blanchard House continue to be very effective. On January 15, the mission will be to un-decorate the house, taking down and packing away the holiday decorations.

The rental contract for the Blanchard House continues to be refined by the Board – membership input is welcomed. We hope to present the new document at the February meeting. Stephanie V. is also working on a brochure to promote the House for rent.

Under old business, a review of the Christmas "open house" Sundays were "especially joyful" with the hosts and hostesses dressed in period costume. We hope to continue the "dressing up" for our summer Sundays as well. A special thank you to Fred Haight and Father Mason for their contributions to our Christmas finery. And a "big hug" to Wilma Ackerson for playing the organ at the open houses and to Phyllis Lobdell for her donation toward the cookies.

Thanks to Joe & Joan McCord for Christmas gifts given to the society, including a copy of the WWII Ionia Veterans book published by the Genealogy Society. Also to Hank and Doni Knoop for the folding table – it will be used for many projects and activities.

Joan Nixon asked if someone would volunteer to back-up Jessica Roach for refreshments at our April meeting.

David McCord reports that the development of a Youth Program continues. The prototype "scavenger hunt" for kids was tested on some Cub Scouts in late December and was a hit. Revisions are under way, and research continues on possible prizes/give-aways for children to remember their experience at the Blanchard House.

Hank Knoop presented the Treasurer's Report, reviewing the highlights of the past two month's financial activity. Despite generous donations, funds are still needed for the "Heat the House" account to get us through the winter. Donations can be made to the Treasurer or at Firstbank of West Michigan. Hank also acknowledged the contributions of Larry Tiejema, our accountant. Other details are available on request, as usual. Also noted that Joan McCord has submitted the latest membership list to the Treasurer, which continues to be updated as new members are acquired.

Under the heading of "New Business" – V.P. Perrin noted that the next Board Meeting would be on the 13th at Knoop's house, due to other scheduling conflicts. She reported to the members the Board's plan to invite area businesses to decorate rooms of the Blanchard House for the next holiday season. More information will be forthcoming as the plan is refined.

The overall agenda for the year is being put together, and now is the time to share any input from the membership regarding fund raising, community events, and especially historical programs and activities. Among these are the March 7 Chamber Expo, an Appraisal Road Show in March (the "Eclectic Gallery" has offered to host), the "Indoor Yard Sale" at the Armory in April, and the Church Tours and Tri-River Tours in May.

Dave Cook then moved to adjourn the meeting, supported by Carol Gallagher, and Joan McCord introduced our guides for the evening' program, Justin Gregory & Julia Sharp.

January 2009 Board Meeting:

The January Board Meeting was called to order at 7:10pm on January 13th at the home of Hank & Doni Knoop, President Linda Ciangi presiding. Others present were Stephanie VanderMolen, Barb Ehlert, Kathleen Perrin, and David McCord.

Winter maintenance at the Blanchard House was the first order of business. Workers from the Sheriff's Dept. have done a great job, but with sub-freezing temps of late, the sidewalks and steps are still mighty dangerous. It was suggested that a warning sign be posted, or perhaps even a chain across the gate. Suggested sign wording was "Caution - May Be Icy" and possibly a footnote to call Linda Ciangi's number for information. No decision was reached but the idea will be considered further.

Thursday the 15th will be the "un-decorating" session, then the 22nd will be the beginning of copying the Hilborn photo collection for future exhibition. It was also suggested that we invite Sue and Brad Garrison (paint and finish experts) to a Thursday evening session to evaluate repairs and interior décor needs.

The Tri-River Group will be meeting in Lowell on January 20th.

The Ionia Expo at the High School is scheduled for March 7. (Past info and a Sentinel article say the 14th, but the fliers mailed out by the Chamber say March 7.) Linda will clarify this ASAP as this will affect the engagement of the Caricaturist for the event. Based on his suggestion, we will employ a "Take a Number" process, and hope to use the PA system to call the numbers at the event. Hank K. suggested that we consider revising our display of information to focus on major upcoming events or topics to attract attention from passers-by more effectively. More to come on this subject, as well as the decision about a door prize. And, contrary to earlier report, the booth may still be shared with the BPW and Girls Night Out groups. The Friends of the Library are only sharing the expense of the Caricaturist for the day. Stand by

for information – volunteers are welcomed.

It was noted that the artist asked for a copy of an ICHS logo that could be printed on each drawing done at the event. Well – we don't have a "logo" per se. So, David McCord was asked to give it some thought and bring some ideas to the next meeting.

The idea of calling off meetings for the winter months was brought up. Some organizations do this, but it was decided that it would interrupt the routine too much and was rejected.

Stephanie created new pages for the Guest Book at the Blanchard House which included spaces for e-mails. A deliberate effort will be made to collect e-mail addresses in the future to keep in touch with our members, supporters, and guests. She also shared a preliminary brochure layout for House Rental, which led to...

Candlemas is the feast of pancakes!

At our house, we've inheirited the French tradition of making crépes on Groundhog Day. For many people worldwide, Candlemas (February 2) means more than the scent of lighted candles, but also the fragrance of pancakes being cooked for family and friends. Everyone takes a turn to flip the pancake with a neat flick of the wrist, deftly manoeuvring the pan with the right hand while holding a gold coin in the left. It mustn't fall, stick to the ceiling, or come back down in shreds. They say that if you achieve this little acrobatic feat successfully, it will bring happiness - and the promise of money - for the coming year!

While the tradition is carried on from one end of France to the other, some regions celebrate with doughnuts: in the Berry region they make apple fritters, in Franche-Comté they are called "beugnets" and in the Yonne they serve "roubigneaux" made from flour and milk, fried in oil and butter.

The ancient celebration was called Imbolc, the mid-point between the Winter Solstice and the Spring Equinox. Pope Gelasius I decided in 472 to Christianize it as the "Feast of the Presentation of the Child Jesus in the Temple", symbolized by light. On Candlemas, candles are brought to the church to be blessed, to be lit later during storms to provide protection from lightning, as well as in the bedrooms of the dying to keep away evil spirits.

(Do they have pancakes in Punxsutawney on February 2?)
