
#### May 2010



**MINUTES** of the **Business Meeting**, May 19, 2010.

President Linda Ciangi called the business meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. - also present were Barb Ehlert, Stephanie VanderMolen, Hank Knoop, David McCord, Doni Knoop, and Phyllis Lobdell.

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# The Journey of the Dexter Colony, 183

At the May meeting of the ICHS, David and Annette McCord greeted the members and guests in their 1830s costumes. The subject of their presentation was the journey of Ionia's founders in 1833, and the circumstances leading up to

The introduction began with apologies for previous statements about this historic saga that have been told without historical accuracy. Some records and legends of that famous event have been found to be inaccurate, if not untrue. Through several months of research (which is always on-going), this report is an attempt to tell the real story as best it can be conveyed. Annette spent many hours researching through old books, publications, census records and genealogical databases to track down the facts. David scoured the Internet for maps and images and historical background to make the story come alive.

David began with a history lesson, covering events in the USA in the few years prior to the Dexter Colony's adventure. The Andrew Jackson presidency and all it's controversies, including issues of state's rights, the threat of civil war. Social scandals and political power-plays were in the news. He also related tales of every-day life of Americans on the "western frontier" beyond the original colonies and the newer states. (There were 24 states at the time, Texas and California were still part of Mexico, the northwest boundaries of the Louisiana Purchase were still contested by the British. Indeed, most of the settlers of Ionia remembered the War of 1812 very well indeed. McCormick's famous reaper, the first American railroads, and the birth of photography were all in the news. And the opening of the Erie Canal just 8 short years before made settlement in the Michigan Territory possible for great numbers of pioneers.

The second part of the presentation addressed Mr. Samuel Dexter's lineage, and the

circumstances surrounding his first trip to Michigan in 1832 with his cousin Dr. John R. Jewett. What most don't realize is that many of the Dexter clan had already moved to Michigan by this time, including Samuel's in-laws and many a cousin. David related this first meeting with Louis



Campau at the Grand Rapids, and encounters with traders and Ottawa natives, and finally a journey to White Pigeon to file the claim.

In the third portion of the presentation, the actual "Dexter Party" was described - all those folks who signed on for the big adventure. All those families who sold all they had, gave up all their home-land connexions, and risked everything to settle in a new wilderness. There were 63 persons in the colony by the time they left the port at Buffalo. In that party, they ranged in age from 4 weeks old to 75 years old, and more than half the group were under the age of 15. When they headed out from Detroit into the forest, they had six covered wagons, horses, oxen, cows, pigs, and dozens of children. They moved slowly through the road-less woods and swamps, stopping at the occasional trading post or Indian village. They spent many nights in tents along the trail. Along the way, one of the children died of a fever and was buried alongside the trail. Their provisions ran low, their supplies were drenched from days of rainfall, and their tools were dull from the cutting of the new wagon-road.

BUT, after all their hardships, 36 days from Herkimer County, New York and 16 days overland from Detroit, they finally reached their claim along the Grand River.

regarding the Blanchard dishes and stemware recently donated.

Linda had 250 new Blanchard House brochures printed at OfficeWorks. The Board will be sending some of these B-House brochures to the D.O.T. to be included in the Tourist Centers at the state border.

Several items were acquired from the Huntley estate recently: a directory of Civil War veterans, pamphlet from the opening of the Ionia Theatre (1931), a 1910 Ionia Yearbook, several Kling family artifacts (to share with the Genealogical Society), and an 1861 Railroad booklet.

The new meeting format was discussed briefly, with comments for and against being shared. The earlier start time for the program is favorable on several accounts. It was suggested that a handout be prepared to share upcoming events and activities with the attendees in lieu of the "business" section of the "program" meetings.

Regarding the weekly workshop sessions, clean-up of the Blanchard

House is progressing well. The dressing room is done, and the upstairs "tea room" is nearly done. The membership will be invited to start a committee to choose floor covering for the Blanchard's bedroom. Sue Garrison and Barb E. have volunteered to help with repairs needed in the conservatory.

The Board voted to have Joan McCord forward the donated 1953 wedding dress to the Belding Historical Society for their collection.

The Tri-River group will be meeting at Edmore on June 15th, at and including a tour of a historic home there. Then, on July 20th, the big summer luncheon for the group will be held at Belding. The ICHS is in need of volunteers to help provide cooking for the main dishes - interested persons please contact Joan McCord. Stephanie shared tickets for the luncheon (\$10 each) and small hand-outs for the event.

Plans for the upcoming "All Class Reunion" include a visit to the Blanchard House on June 26 & 27. Funding is needed for the project to re-roof the carriage house. Hank Knoop composed a request for donations to be included in the Chronicle. Stephanie will layout the flier (with suggestions from the Board) in time for the next edition.

The revisions for the Funeral Luncheon letter were reviewed. Stephanie will set up the cover letter on ICHS letterhead to be sent to area Funeral Directors, and create a 1/3page insert for our Blanchard House brochures to detail the rental arrangements, etc.

The June 7 book signing with R.L. Hamilton is coming up, being heavily promoted by the Library. Members are being encouraged to dress in historic costume. Details on the calendar and the ICHS website.

The ICHS Yard Sale / Flea Market plan is on schedule, chaired by Doni and Barb. A letter is going out to Blanchard House neighbors to let them know what's happening, and signs are being prepared to put on the fence. There are four participants: the ICHS, the Library, Garden Club, and a guy with a Mosquito Repellent device.

The Free Fair's Antique Village will be in the Floral Building this year. In fact, it will occupy the ENTIRE Floral Building. Another item from the Huntley estate is Free Fair Parade films, which we hope to have transferred to DVD to play at the Village display. Linda also is working on a float for the Parade with a Railroad theme, working with Marilyn Nash.

The Summer Sundays schedule is shaping up nicely, thanks to Joan McCord's efforts. Still to be confirmed are August 1 (a possible "photography" theme?) and August 22 (music by David McCord et al?).

Barb Hogan continues to catalog artifacts, and Carol Gallagher wants to be involved in the Accessions Committee. Said committee needs to get a meeting scheduled. Books which have been sorted and marked are ready to sell - some on eBay, some at the yard sale.

The meeting was adjourned at approx. 8:45 p.m.

There, they made good Sam Dexter's bargain with the local Ottawa chief, Cobmoosa, and his band of natives. The Indians moved west, giving over their newly planted gardens and a few bark-covered wigwams to the settlers. Almost immediately, the fledgling town began to organize, to elect, to send representatives to the territorial government, and to carve a town out of the Michigan woodland.

David and Annette's presentation will soon be available in booklet form, complete with illustrations, maps, paintings and photographs, We hope those of you readers who missed the meeting will be able to get hold of a copy very soon.

July 18th A display celebrating the Churches of Ionia, with old hymns being played on our antique church organ.


July 25th Ionia Free Fair will be the high-light of the weekend, including images of Fairs of Yesterday.
