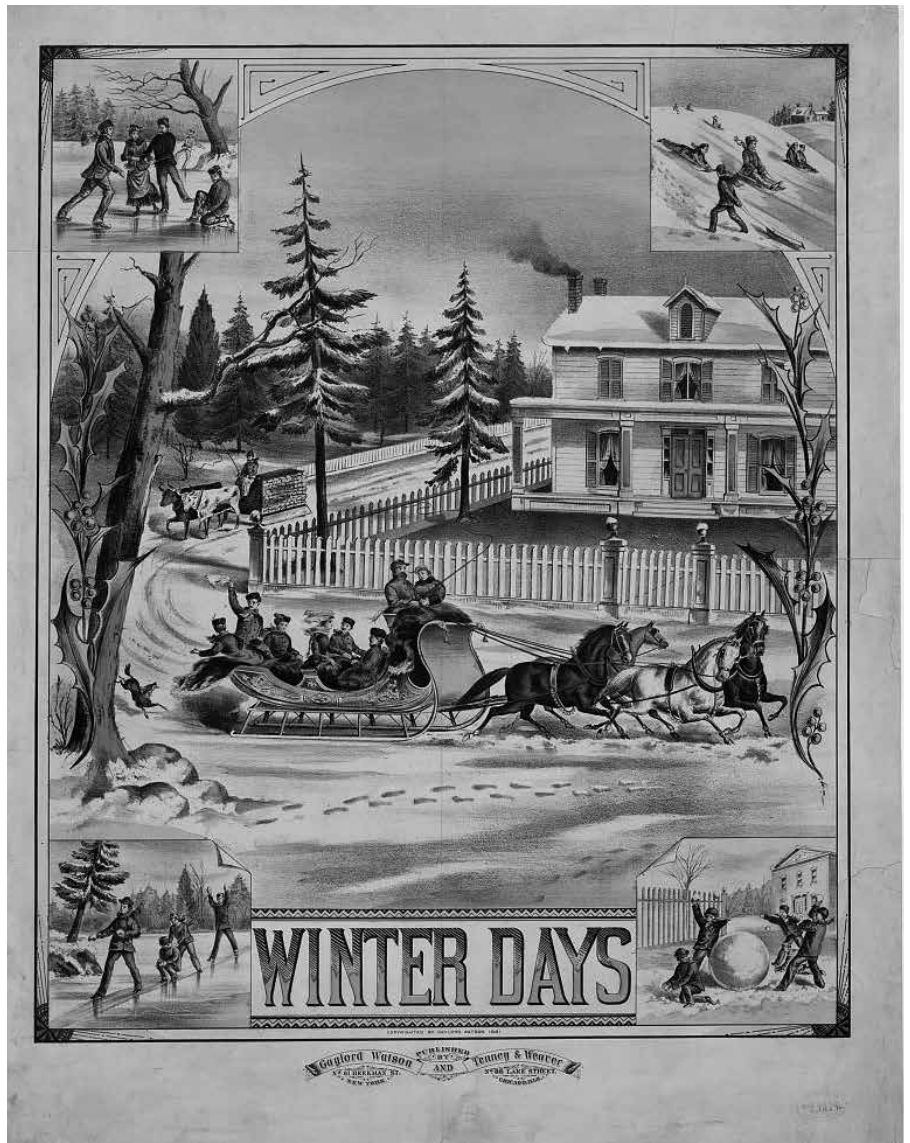

Past News & Events — OCTOBER:

On October 2nd, the members of the ICHS gathered together for the Annual Meeting. President Linda C. reviewed upcoming events and activities, including the monthly Sundays for the season and Holiday open house schedule (seeking volunteers to host at the Blanchard House). She also thanked our hosts for special tours this month, including several Scout groups and an auto club. In support of the "Thursday Night on the Bricks" event in downtown Ionia, the ICHS will be giving away books - many, many books donated from the estate of Joan and Joe McCord by the family.

Treasurer Kathleen Cook reported on incoming memberships and recent donations, including a generous donation from life-member Sarah Hamilton. Board member Stacy Tchorzynski also reported that her recent "birthday challenge" brought in \$500 in donations for us!

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David M. reported that the Freeport Historical Society was asking for folks to participate in a large celebration in August of 2020 to commemorate Women's Suffrage in Michigan. David will share additional information as it becomes available.

Kathleen Cook suggested that the ICHS could be more environmentally responsible if we stopped using paper, plastic, and foam cups. Instead, she suggested using washable coffee mugs that are souvenirs of Ionia businesses and events.

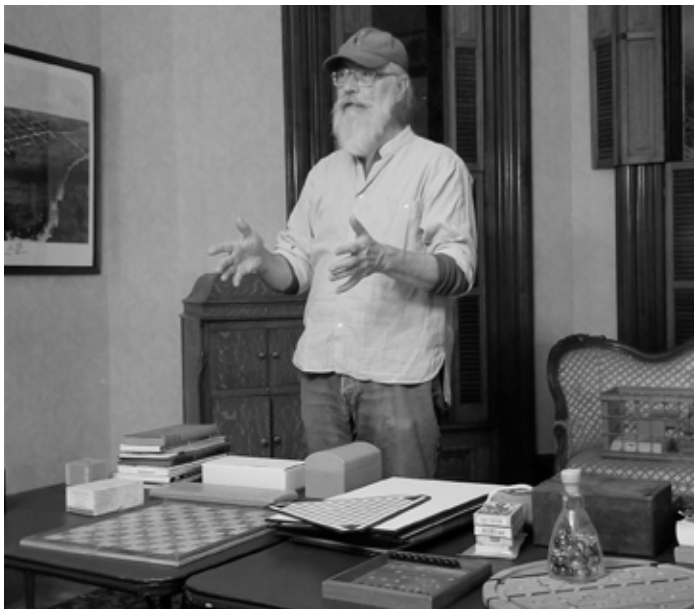
The Cemetery Tour was once again a great success! There was a bit of a chill in the wind, but we had very good attendance and made good money. There were a host of suggestions to help improve future tours. We will be looking for sponsors to help pay for our few expenses at the event, and many attendees asked for our subjects' biographies to be offered as a pamphlet they could take away after the event.

The Annual Meeting was called to order at 7:55 on the same evening, and ballots were collected both mailed-in and from members at the meeting. The result was the election of Stacy T. and Kathleen Cook (incumbents) and Bryan Kimble. Thanks to Ron Thomas for throwing his hat in the ring as well. The Annual Meeting was adjourned by 8:20 p.m.

The new Board assembled directly after the meeting, and they elected the following officers for the coming year: President Kathleen Cook, Vice President Katelyn Mooney, Treasurer Mary Kimble, and Secretary David McCord.

NOVEMBER:

In November, the monthly program meeting was a presentation from David McCord about Victorian Parlor Games and the roots of the



board games that are still popular today. He engaged several members in the audience in a demonstration of "Tableau" - a version of Charades in which the clue-giving team strikes a pose, and the other team tries to guess the scene.

The November 27th Board meeting was held an hour early (a last-minute change to the schedule). On the agenda was a call for a "Publicity Committee" and ICHS President Kathleen Cook nominated David McCord for the position. He said he would give it some thought and come back to the Board with a proposal.

Mary Kimble reported that she, as Treasurer, was working on a membership drive, with postcard reminders to past members and Business Buddies. This will be mailed out the first of the year so as not to get lost in the Holiday festivities.

The ICHS calendar for 2020 was discussed for some time, and the results can be seen in the Events Calendar in this issue. The Board continues to invite suggestions from members for monthly programs, and would encourage someone to take over as Program Chairman to handle this aspect of our yearly activities!

DECEMBER:

Linda C. represented the ICHS at the "Festival of Tables" event at the FUMC, and Katelyn Mooney was again in charge of a successful ICHS booth at the Mrs. Claus Bazaar this year. December Sundays at the Blanchard House were well attended, even though we were short of hosts on a couple of those days. Thanks to those who could help out.

Linda also reported that the Raffle permit has been received and she will have tickets printed soon so we can start selling the first of the year. Prizes will be: First Place - an ICHS souvenir throw; Second Place - a free rental of the Blanchard House for an evening; Third Place - a packet of local gift cards and certificates for a "night on the town". WAYBACK



1820 - 200 Years Ago:

January 29 – George IV of the United Kingdom ascended the throne, on the death of his father George III after 59 years on the throne. (Yes, the King George that "lost the colonies" in the 1770s.) This ended the period known as the British Regency.



January 30 – Irish Royal Navy captain Edward Bransfield landed on the mainland of Antarctica. The mainland had just been discovered by a Russian vessel a few weeks earlier - the first notion of a land mass under the southern ice fields.

February 6 - The US population announced at 9,638,453. African Americans numbered 1,771,656 (18.4%). On the same day, the first organized emigration of blacks back to Africa left New York for Sierra Leone, and the American Colonization Society started a settlement of 86 blacks in present-day Liberia.



March 3 – The Missouri Compromise became law, allowing the admission of Missouri as a slave state and Maine as a free state. President James Monroe was in office, and his daughter Maria became the first child of a President to marry in the White House on March 8th.

March 26 - Future Mormon church leader Joseph Smith had his "First Vision" in a wooded area near Manchester, New York. The location is now known as the Sacred Grove.

1870 - 150 Years Ago:

Early 1870 was a significant time in the reconstruction of the United States after the dissolution of the Confederacy. As the states conformed to the readmission process, the military governors appointed by the President were dismissed and local governance restored. On the 10th of January, the Georgia state legislature officially reconvened, on the 16th, Virginia was readmitted, and Mississippi followed on February 23rd. Finally, on March 30, Texas became the last confederate state readmitted to Union.

January 3 - Construction began on the famous Brooklyn Bridge in New York. It wasn't completed until May 24, 1883.



January 20 - Integration got off to a good start when Hiram R. Revels was elected to fill the unexpired term of Jefferson Davis as US Senator for Mississippi. This story, though not known by many, has tremendous significance in the nation's history. A week after this election, the state of Iowa ratified the 15th Amendment of the United States



Constitution allowing suffrage for all races & colors. By March 30, the Amendment was signed into law.

January 23 - The bloody genocide by the U.S. Government called "the Indian Wars" raged on. On this day, 173 Blackfoot were killed in Montana by the US Army. 140 of them were women & children.

1920 - 100 Years Ago:

During January, the League of Nations held their first assembly in Paris. One of their earliest resolutions was to recognize

the perpetual neutrality of Switzerland. In March, the US Senate rejected the Treaty of Versailles for a second time, refusing to ratify the League of Nations' covenant. Thus, the US maintained a policy of isolation by not joining the rest of the world's cooperative efforts.

February 14 - The League of Women Voters was formed in Chicago.

March 28 - The "Palm Sunday Tornadoes" affected the entire Great Lakes region and Deep South states with no less than 37 separate storms. Many homes and farms were destroyed and 11 deaths were recorded through central Michigan.

1970 - 50 Years Ago:

The Beatles last recording session as a group was wrapped on January 4th at EMI studios. The final song was the highlight of the album: "Let It Be." Three weeks later was the release of "Bridge over Troubled Water" - the fifth and final studio album by Simon & Garfunkel (Grammy Award: Album of the Year). On March 27, Ringo Starr released his first solo album, entitled "Sentimental Journey." Putting this in perspective, March 21 was the television debut of the Jackson 5 on "American Bandstand".



"M*A*S*H" was released on January 25th. Directed by Robert Altman, starring Donald Sutherland and Elliott Gould, the award-winning film was one of the first to receive a "PG" rating (previously classified as "M"). On February 4, "Patton" premiered in New York City. Directed by Franklin J. Schaffner and starring George C. Scott, the film earned the Academy Award for Best Picture.



January 2 - The US population reached 293,200,000. In March, the US Government lowered the voting age from 21 to 18, put an end to commercial whale hunting, and the Supreme Court ruled that draft evaders could not be penalized after 5 years.

January 16 - Buckminster Fuller received the Gold Medal award from the American Institute of Architects.

March 5 - The Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty (NPT) went into effect, seeking to inhibit the spread of nuclear weapons. Under the treaty, all 190 "states-parties" that signed the treaty commit to pursue "general and complete disarmament," and the non-nuclear-weapons parties agreed they would not develop or acquire nuclear weapons.

Ironically, the US exploded its 500th nuclear bomb on March 26th (strictly experimental.)



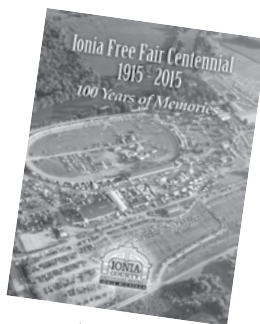

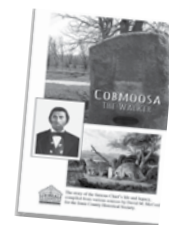

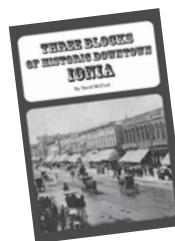

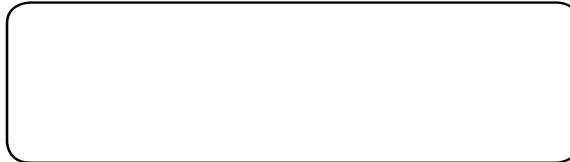
