### A Message from the ICHS President, Kathleen Cook

Dear ICHS Members and Friends,

I hope this letter finds all of you well. Some of you may think that we have been hibernating these last few

months, but we have been very busy!

The board decided that the best use of our time would be to strategically plan. It was decided that we would obtain guidance from an exhibit coach. We are working with Suzanne Fischer who once worked for the Michigan History Museum in Lansing. She met with Stacy Tchorzynski and me and was able to tour the Blanchard House, Carriage House and look at our storage space at the National Bank Building. In addition, she will review our by-laws, rental agreement, etc. and make recommendations. She understands that our number one priority is the care and maintenance of the Blanchard House and local artifacts. I am excited to hear what she has to say so that we can best prioritize to ensure that we are following best practices for our museums.

Our "Wednesday Workdays" have been productive, and we are excited for the upcoming year. ICHS will be celebrating a

50th anniversary and David McCord has sent a press release to the Historical Society of Michigan to both publications, the Michigan Chronicle and Michigan History Magazine.

David just completed a booklet, "Hudsons in Ionia" and he is already busy working on a souvenir booklet for the ICHS's 50th. We have not decided how we will celebrate our anniversary so if you are interested in helping us plan, reach out. Let's make this a fun event!

Our first meeting of the year will be on April 3rd, at 7:00 p.m. at the Blanchard House. John Milewski, our new mayor, will be our special guest but he will not be the program. We are still working on that. I know that we will be discussing plans for the "Spring into the Past" event on Sunday, May 5th. (Typically, we would participate on Saturday too, but we have a rental.) The theme is "Notable Names" meaning landmarks named for local citizens. *If anyone is interested in help to put together a display on that subject, please let us know!* 

Lastly, I have been meeting, (represented by David McCord when I have been unable) with Shane Houghton and other "Save the 21st Infantry Flag" committee members and I am happy to report that a large portion of the money has been raised. The Historical Society is not in charge saving the flag, but I consider it our community's most historic item. Thus, David and D&D are undeniably a part of Ionia's history! When COVID started, David began providing professional game master services online and has since run over 620 professional sessions. David is trained as a Certified Therapeutic Game Master and now regularly runs live Dungeons and Dragons sessions online and in person at conventions for 3rd party companies.

D&D is now officially a historic pastime, so this year, we plan to continue celebrating its history through live play sessions, including many more games at the Blanchard House to benefit the organization. ## WAYBACK

#### 1824 - 200 Years Ago —

In the spring of 1824, the Cumash tribe in the Spanish colony of California rebelled against the foreign power in their lands. The Spanish invaders The Mexican military finally put down the rebellion in late March. In May 1824, Friar Ripoll of Mission Santa Barbara wrote an appeal to the governor of California that defended and explained the actions of the Chumash, although his explanation was extremely bigoted. The defense was accepted by the governor, who issued a general pardon on May 16, 1824.

The spring of 1824 also saw the publication of "The Life of Mary Jemison" by James E. Seaver. It was a true account of Mary who had been abducted by Indians in Pennsylvania in 1758 and spent the rest of her life as a member of the Seneca tribe.

U.S. History is filled with challenges in the clash of indigenous cultures and European newcomers. Partly in response to these incidents, Henry Calhoun, Secretary of War at the time, formed the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington. (The Bureau was not officially authorized until 1832.)

One more item on the First Nations front; On May 26, the Arkansas Territory was split, creating Indian Territory (later called Oklahoma).

For something completely different, Ludwig von Beethoven's Ninth Symphony was first performed in Vienna on May 7th.





#### 1874 - 150 Years Ago —

...and 50 years later, Johann Strauss Jr's opera "Die Fledermaus" premiered in Vienna (May 17th).

On March 18, the Kingdom of Hawaii signed a treaty with the United States granting exclusive trading rights.

**IONIA:** The census of 1874 credited the young City of Ionia with a population of 3,251. The County was tallied at 28,376.

The city officers were: Mayor, James M. Kidd; clerk, C. H. Spencer; treasurer, John W. Baldie, marshal, Charles Broad; attorney, W. O. Webster. The police force consisted of the marshal and a night watchman, S. M. Norton.



Also in 1874 \$1,100 were expended for repairs to the County Building in Ionia's town square, and an addition was built on as well.

The Michigan Suffrage Association was formed in January of 1870. The public mind was prepared for the serious consideration of a suffrage amendment to the State Constitution which was submitted in 1874. With the overwhelming defeat of this measure, 40,077 voting for the amendment and 135,957 against it, the women received a set-back from which they did not easily recover.

#### 1924 - 100 Years Ago —

On April 17, Metro Pictures, Goldwyn Pictures & Louis B Mayer Comerged to form Metro Goldwyn Mayer (MGM).

April 18: The first crossword puzzle is published by Simon & Schuster.

In May of this year, J. Edgar Hoover, a 29-year-old lawyer, became the U.S. Justice Department's Acting Director of the Bureau of Investigation, the predecessor to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).



U.S. President Calvin Coolidge signed an immigration law on May 26 to restrict immigration to the United



States (photo below). The law includes the Asian Exclusion Act banning the entry of Asian peoples to the United States from a variety of countries. It's considered one of the most famous events in 1924.

#### 1974 - 50 Years Ago —

The last Japanese soldier, a guerrilla operating in the Philippines, surrendered on March

9th, 29 years after World War II ended.

Also in March, Chinese farmers discover the Terracotta Army near Xi'an, 8,000 clay warrior statues buried to guard the tomb of China's 1st emperor, Qin Shi Huang.




